About...

Edward Humes

The author of seven books, Ed Humes was awarded Pulitzer Prize in 1989 for specialized reporting for his coverage of the military. The stories that year included an investigation of decades of fatal helicopter crashes linked to faulty night-vision devices the Pentagon knew were unsuitable for flight; dispatches from Panama during the final days of General Manuel Noriega; an examination of the Navy's secret research program on dolphins and whales; and the story of the unjust execution of an Army private during World War II, and his nephew's efforts fifty years later to clear his name.

Humes began his career with *Texas Observer* magazine in Austin after graduating from Hampshire College, Amherst, Mass. He then worked for the next ten years as a full-time newspaper reporter at the *Pine Bluff* (Arkansas) *Commercial*, the *Tucson* (Arizona) *Citizen*, and the *Orange County* (California) *Register*.

In 1989, he left newspapers to write books full time. He also has consulted for CBS News' *Sixty Minutes* and has written for numerous magazines, including a stint as a columnist for the late *Buzz Magazine*. His work has appeared in the *Los Angeles Times Magazine*, *Readers Digest*, *California Lawyer*, the *Oxford American* and the *New York Times*. He currently lives in southern California.
